Signs such as withdrawal, anxiety, or unexplained anger can indicate exploitation. These changes are often subtle and attributed to typical adolescent behavior, leading to missed warning signs.

Preventive Measures

- Open Communication: Encourage children to discuss their relationships and experiences without fear of judgment.
- Education: Teach children about appropriate boundaries and the tactics used by groomers.a2awisconsin.org+3The Sun+3WhatIsMyIPAddress+3

- Aaliyah was only 15 years old when she illegally married R. Kelly, who was 27 at the time.
- The marriage certificate was falsified to list Aaliyah's age as 18.

- Property of the relationship was kept under wraps, and Aaliyah rarely spoke about it publicly.
- R. Kelly was her mentor and producer, which created a power imbalance and dependency.
- 4 The marriage was annulled in 1995 after Aaliyah's family found out.
- Classic signs of grooming and industry-enabled abuse Aaliyah was isolated, heavily controlled, and exploited under the guise of mentorship.

What This Case Shows

- Fame and influence can shield predators and silence victims.
- Victims may not realize they were exploited until years later.
- • Industry insiders often look the other way to protect reputations and profits.
